A Look Ahead: Projects and Events in 2026

We have several exciting projects happening across the park district, including a brand-new area planned to open in 2026. This new natural area will cover about 50 acres and include hiking trails, ponds, and scenic views along the Auglaize River. Updates also continue to progress at Ottawa Metro Park. The area around the old swim beach is expected to reopen later this spring or early summer for fishing and non-swimming water recreation. We're still working through fishing regulations, and fencing around the area will be removed to make access easier.

In addition to these updates, we have several improvement projects planned throughout your parks. Ottawa Metro Park will see paving upgrades, shelter roofs in various parks will be replaced, and new signage will be installed to help visitors better navigate and enjoy the

parks. These updates are all part of our ongoing efforts to keep our parks safe, accessible, and enjoyable for everyone.

We're also already planning ahead for two favorite events in 2026. Maple Festival will be held on March 7th at McLean Teddy Bear Park from 10 am to 4 pm. It will include hands-on activities, interpretive stops, and a look at the history of maple syrup production. Finally, Apple Festival returns to the Lauer Historical Farm the first weekend in October, featuring family-friendly activities, live music, and food trucks.

We look forward to another year of serving you and growing our parks together.

Naturalist Notebook

“Spring Wildlife Babies: What to do if you find one!”

Spring brings rain showers, blooming flowers, and one of the most incredible sights of nature: wildlife babies. From wobbly fawns to fledgling birds, young animals will start to be everywhere. Sometimes these young animals will be sighted on their own, and while it is natural to feel concern for them when they are alone, most of the time they are not actually abandoned or in danger.

One of the most commonly “rescued” animals in springtime is the white-tailed deer fawn. Newborn fawns spend their first few weeks hiding away in protected areas while their mothers forage for food somewhere else. For the first few weeks of their lives, fawns are scentless. This defense makes it so no predators can smell out the fawn, and they are safe for this period. Even though the fawn is scentless, the mother is not. This is why fawns are so often found alone in the wild. The mothers will leave their babies alone for hours at a time to keep any scents away and keep them safe from predators. The mother will return to feed the fawn, though infrequently, to guarantee their safety and survival.

Fledglings are also commonly seen on their own. They can be identified as fledglings due to their fluffy or scruffy looking patches of feathers. These young birds are done with their nest but are still working on flying. They will often flutter around for



short distances and spend a lot of time on low branches or on the ground. They are learning essential skills in these moments and are not often alone. Their parents are usually nearby, watching them and bringing food when needed. Without these learning moments, these young birds would never be able to survive in the wild on their own.

Eastern Cottontail kits are another young animal that are often found alone. However, these babies are not just out and about alone, they are still in their nest when found. Rabbits will often make nests for their young in lawns, gardens, flower beds, or grassy fields. These are commonly visited areas by humans too, and this is why these nests are spotted so often. Baby rabbits are born blind, hairless, and extremely vulnerable, and their best form of defense is staying still and quiet. This is why mother rabbits do not stay with their young in the nests. The adult would attract attention to the nest and lead predators right to the babies. The mother rabbit visits the nest only a couple times a day to feed her babies, usually at dawn and dusk, and the rest of the day she is doing her best to keep them safe.

When encountering a baby animal, the most important thing we can do is leave it alone. Although it may feel right to help, intervening can cause more harm than good. The best way to help is to give the baby plenty of



space and try to keep people and pets away from them. Stress and disturbance cause the parent to avoid returning, putting the baby at risk. Leaving the baby exactly where you find it is the best thing you can do for them because they are usually exactly where they are supposed to be. Parent animals will leave their babies in a specific location and know how to return to them. If the baby is moved the adult will no longer know how to find them, and this can lead to abandonment.

The only time to intervene is when you can visibly see that the baby is in immediate danger. This would include if the baby is in a road and at risk of being hit, if they are visibly injured in some way, or if you know for a fact that the adult is deceased and the young cannot care for itself. Wild animals are remarkably adapted to survive without human intervention. By knowing the normal behavior of animals and responding thoughtfully, we can help give wildlife babies the best chance they have to grow up healthy and wild.

Cooperative Park Improvement Grant Program (CPIGP) Continues to Make an Impact

The Cooperative Park Improvement Grant Program (CPIGP) continues to make an impact on village and city parks in Allen County. The CPIGP was started in 1994 and to date has awarded over \$2 million dollars to help build playgrounds, restrooms, shelters, baseball diamonds and more in the twelve eligible political subdivisions.

Each eligible political subdivision appoints a representative by their legislative body to be on the CPIGP Review Team. On December 11, 2025 the grant review

team met to review the grant applications submitted from seven political subdivisions and select projects for funding. Projects are selected for funding by:

- 1) Health and Safety Issues
- 2) Major Repairs to Upgrade Existing Facilities
- 3) New Outdoor Recreation Needs
- 4) Special Opportunities (Grants, Emergencies, Joint Efforts, Etc.)

The Park District Commissioners approved a total of \$153,150.00/ year revenue sharing for 2026 provided by the Johnny Appleseed Metropolitan Park District.

Campground To Open For Season

Ottawa Metro Park Campground at 2632 Ada Road, will open on Friday, April 17 at 8 am and remain open through Sunday, October 18, 2026.

- 30 family campsites with 3 handicap accessible sites on a first-come, first served basis. Each site has water, electric, picnic table, and fire ring.
- Campsites can be occupied by a maximum of 2 tents, or 1 tent and 1 mobile camping unit.
- Cost per night is \$35
- \$30 per night (Seniors 60+ with proper ID)
